Back Before Pilate

1. Luke 23:13-20

- A. There were no charges to substantiate putting Jesus to death.
- B. Pilate tried to compromise with the Jews by having Jesus scourged.
- C. Matt. 27:19—Pilate's wife warns him not to have anything to do with the death of Jesus.
- D. Pilate was determined to release Jesus.
 - i. Every Passover he released a prisoner.
 - ii. Matt. 27:15-22.
 - Pilate was amazed the people would choose a murderer over Jesus. This action only heightened his contempt for the Jews.
- E. Pilate feared another riot because of previous problems he had with the Jews.
- 2. Luke 22:21
 - A. Vs 22—Again Pilate pleads for Jesus' life.
 - B. Matt. 27:24-25.
 - i. Pilate tried to wash his hands of the innocent blood.
 - ii. Jews willingly accepted all consequences and 40 years later their city and lives would be destroyed.
- 3. Matt. 27:26-30
 - A. Many men died while being scourged.
 - B. Matt. 8:14-17.
 - C. The soldier mocked Him and the Jewish nation.

- 4. John 19:5-15
 - A. Vs 5—Again Pilate tried to release Jesus.
 - B. The priests would not be denied.
 - C. Vs 12—Jews threatened Pilate with a report to Caesar.
 - D. Vs 14—Pilate tried again to gain His freedom.
 - E. Pilate finally gave up and ordered Jesus' crucifixion.
- 5. John 19:17
 - A. Mark 15:21
 - B. Luke 23:27-31
 - i. He gave a word of comfort to the woman.
 - ii. There is no record of a woman ever betraying Him in the scripture.

Jesus' Trial Before Sanhedrin

1. John 18:13-14

- A. Jesus would undergo several trials this night.
 - i. First before Annas the high priest.
 - ii. 2nd before Caiaphas & the Sanhedrin
 - iii. 3rd before Caiaphas and Sanhedrin again.
 - iv. Finally before Pontius Pilate the Roman governor.

B. Roman rule gave the Jews authority in religious matters but they could not execute anyone.

C. Annas was a Sadducee.

- i. Sadducees were hated by the people.
- ii. The merchandising in the temple was for the personal financial gain.
- 2. John 18:19-23
 - A. This hearing before Annas had no legal standing.
 - B. Annas insinuated that Jesus was trying to gather disciples to start a revolution.
 - C. Annas could not get Jesus to condemn himself so he sent Him to Caiaphas.
- 3. Matthew 26:59-61
 - A. All the rulers of Jewish Law were thrown out for this trial.
 - i. Defense witnesses were to speak first.
 - ii. All of the prosecutions evidence had to be backed up by a 2nd witness.

- B. Their minds were already made up to kill Him.
- $C. \ \ This trial was merely a formality.$
- 4. Matthew 26:62-63
 - A. Jesus would not defend Himself because the charges disproved themselves.
 - B. Jesus acknowledged the high priest had the right to put Him on oath.
 - C. His answer would incriminate Him but He did not hesitate—Mk. 14:62.
- 5. Matthew 26:65-68
 - A. Jesus is condemned for blasphemy.
 - B. It is hard to believe what began to happen.
 - i. Try to imagine a trial where the judges and jury are allowed to strike the condemned man.
 - ii. Matt. 26:53
- 6. Matthew 26:69-75
 - A. John 18:15-16
 - B. The young girl rattled him.
 - C. Matt. 16:16
 - D. Luke 22:60-61
 - E. Was Peter any different than Judas?

Jesus Before Pilate

- 1. Luke 22:66-71
 - A. When daylight came Jesus was brought back before the Sanhedrin.
 - B. They would have liked to have killed Him then but they could not because of Roman law.

- C. The Charge of blasphemy was useless before Pilate therefore they needed something to charge Him with politically.
- D. Matthew 27:3-5—Judas tried to reverse his deeds.

2. John 18:28

- A. Pilate did not like the Jews and they did not like him.
- B. The priests tried to bluff Pilate into not having a trial.
- C. The Jews hated to admit they could knot kill Him themselves.
- D. Luke 23:1-2—They told a deliberate lie.
- E. Vs 36—He was no threat to Rome.
- F. Vs 38—Pilate actually acquitted Jesus.

G. Luke 23:5—The not guilty verdict is not what the Jews wanted.

- i. Galilee was under Herod's rule.
- ii. Pilate thought this gave him a way of escape.

Jesus Before Herod

- 1. Luke 23:8.
 - A. Matt. 14:2—Herod was a superstitious man.
 - B. Luke 13:31-32—Jesus was not afraid of Herod.
 - C. Herod wanted Jesus to use His power to entertain him.
 - i. No doubt Herod would have let Him go if He had performed a miracle.
 - ii. 2. Matthew 7:6
